According to the Online Etymology Dictionary, the term first appeared in the English language in the British Isles in the mid-fourteenth century. At the time it meant “eager or inordinate desire for preferment or honor.” It came from the Old French word Ambicion, which originated from the Latin word Ambitionem (nominative Ambitio), with the meaning “a going around, courting favor” especially to gain votes. In its early days, the English term had a pejorative meaning and was grouped with vainglory, pride, and arrogance.
